

Herald of Free Enterprise — 36th Anniversary.



On Friday, 6th March 1987 at 18.30 hours GMT, The Herald of Free Enterprise on passage to Dover, carrying 430 passengers and 80 crew, capsized off Zeebrugge with the loss of 193 lives.

This had a major effect on the people of Dover as so many had worked on ferries or had family who died. Of the 80 local crew 39 died, most Dovorians of that era can tell you where they were when they heard the news (I was in a hotel bar 6000 miles away).

The annual Remembrance services have taken many forms but after 35 years, and the withdrawal of all Sailors' Society clergy from the South East it was decided to stop the formal service in St Mary's and just have a simple service on the sea front.

On Sunday 5th March the Dover Port Chaplains team led the Act of Remembrance, the two minute silence, the reading of the roll, a blessing and then further prayers at the Pier Head when flowers were cast into the sea.

It was bitter weather, but no worse than the night of the disaster, and still 40 people gathered in remembrance: from family members, survivors, a diver from the wreck and civic leaders.

The media were there and we made the second item on the Meridian news that evening.

It was only 25 minutes for the main event, but whilst there are so many local families still grieving it cannot be forgotten.


A Journey through to Easter

Vacancy for: Volunteer Treasurer

Kent Workplace Mission supporting Chaplaincy in the Workplace across Kent

The Treasurer is a Trustee of the charity responsible to the Council for developing financial strategy and ensuring delivery.

The Treasurer works closely with the Administrator who normally handles financial transactions, book-keeping, and banking.

The Treasurer's contribution includes:

Leading thinking on financial strategy

Leading fundraising for the charity

Preparing the annual accounts

Reporting the current position at the Operations Group and Trustee Council meetings

There is a requirement for the Treasurer to be a practising Christian. He or she will mostly work from home but also attends meetings either on Zoom or at the Larkfield base, including the Council four times a year and the Operations Group on about another six occasions. Reasonable expenses can be reimbursed.

Kent Workplace Mission is a Local Ecumenical Partnership of Churches Together in Kent, and a registered charity. We promote and resource workplace chaplaincy as a model of mission, community engagement, and loving service. We work in partnership with local congregations and workplaces to offer chaplaincy support services across Kent, Bexley and Bromley. We currently have teams in businesses, local councils, and town centres across the region. The majority of our chaplains are volunteers.

The Trustees of KWM are hoping to fill the above vacancy before the AGM in May 2023 to allow a handover period from the retiring Treasurer.

Hard work for Lent

Most of the prominent people in Kent Workplace Mission are natural activists. The work they do for KWM is but a fraction of their whole Christian service. Finding dates for meetings when even a small number are all free simultaneously is always a challenge. And without their commitment KWM would collapse.

The story we usually link most tightly with Lent is Jesus escaping from any normal “work” for forty days – almost a sabbatical. He did not clear his diary of trivia in order to work harder but to do nothing. Except that when I sat alone in the desert above the Dead Sea a few years ago it did not feel like doing nothing. It was an extraordinarily intense experience. “Doing nothing” is such hard work, especially if you sense the whole earthly journey of Jesus being burnt into your consciousness by the sun.

Activity returned of course, as it did for Jesus. The busy world is never hushed for long. There are five more emails already. But a bit of “doing nothing” might make my answers better.

If you are just off to do a bit of chaplaincy, remember that the people you meet may covet your unusually still centre more than your impressively full diary.
